The text records the story of a little-known woman of Shunem referred to as the Shunammite woman. Hers is a story of faith, noted Rev. Stacey Lalor Knowles. She is portrayed as a faithful and fervent servant of God who showed hospitality to Elisha, opening not only her heart, but her home to him. Eventually, God rewarded her and blessed her with a son. Her world turned upside down as the child she hoped and prayed for suddenly fell ill and died. On Mothers' Day, May 12, 2024 Reverend Stacey Lalor Knowles highlighted the lessons to be learnt from the depth of faith displayed by this woman.

Faith tested

The mother's faith was tested in a most dramatic and devastating way. A day like today may remind us of the loss of a child or a wayward child. Loss presents a crisis of faith, but God brings comfort and joy.

Demonstrated faith in God

She took the dead child and laid him on the bed of Elisha—her husband was skeptical, but she refused to give up. God's last word to us is not death! In this woman's mind God can do the impossible.

Her son being restored to life, her faith is vindicated. Her husband would develop faith, and as mothers we can pass on to our children our faith and belief in God.

When we pray God delivers!

hile visiting my home church on the first Sunday in May, the preacher asked the congregation to observe a minute of silence for a member who recently passed. In making this request, he spoke of the struggles this member had in her quest to be baptized to become a member of the church. The obstacle she faced was that she was living in a common-law relationship. The preacher recalled that the church had a special prayer meeting dedicated to this member and her circumstances. It was not long after she got married and was subsequently baptized, becoming a faithful and dedicated member of the church.

We can agree that her case is not an isolated one, as many such scenarios exist. While attending the United Theological College of the West Indies (UTCWI), I would trespass on a few denominational classes for the Baptist students taught by Rev. Glenroy Lalor who was the Baptist warden at the time. Each student would relate their experience with the church they were assigned and challenges faced. In one of those Monday morning classes one of the problems highlighted was women in common-law relationships who had the desire for baptism and the dilemma faced by the student pastors of what to do.

Rev. Glenroy Lalor related a similar situation he had while he pastored a church, where members of the community were cynical about a young lady becoming a member of the church. However, she soon got married and serving her church well. Additionally, in one of my classes, a Methodist student related a similar experience at his church. He said the church went into a series of prayer meeting and God delivered! The young lady got married, leading to her baptism and church membership.

Prayer is a powerful force to tum around difficult situations faced by families, both in our personal family and the family of God. Once families thrive, this filters into society, and what a world to behold.



Postpartum Depression

Many women have the baby blues after childbirth. If you have the baby blues, you may have mood swings, feel sad, anxious or overwhelmed, have crying spells, lose your appetite, or have trouble sleeping. The baby blues most often go away within a few days or a week. The symptoms are not severe and do not need treatment.

The symptoms of postpartum depression last longer and are more severe. You may also feel hopeless and worthless and lose interest in the baby. You may have thoughts of hurting yourself or the baby. Very rarely, new mothers develop something even more serious. They may have hallucinations or try to hurt themselves or the baby. They need to get treatment right away, often in the hospital.

Postpartum depression can begin anytime within the first year after childbirth. The cause is unknown. Hormonal and physical changes after birth and the stress of caring for a new baby may play a role. Women who have had depression are at higher risk.

If you think you have postpartum depression, tell your health care provider. Medicines, including antidepressants, and talk therapy can help you get well.
